Message from the Chief of Police

I am pleased to present the Annual Report for the Red Bank Police Department for 2024. As your Chief of Police, I am proud to share with you the accomplishments, challenges and ongoing efforts of our department in ensuring the safety and well-being of our community.

Throughout the past year, we have worked diligently to maintain and enhance public safety through a commitment to professionalism, transparency, and community collaboration. Our officers continue to serve with integrity, dedication and a focus on building trust with all residents. We recognize that community policing is vital to our success, and we are grateful for the support and partnership of our citizens.

In 2024, our department focused on enhancing community engagement, reducing crime, and fostering transparency. Together, we:

- Expanded our community policing initiatives, participated in community functions and hosted a coffee-with-a-cop.
- Decreased overall violent crime, thanks to strategic patrols and collaborative efforts.
- Enhanced distracted driving education and enforcement.
- Established a Violent Crimes Detective position to enhance response times and investigative capabilities, with the position's salary funded through the state's Violent Crimes Intervention Fund (VCIF) grant.

I am also pleased to report that the overall crime rate for our community has shown a consistent downward trend over the past decade. In 2014, the crime rate for Red Bank was reported at 108.57, decreasing to 56.94 in 2023. The crime rates are based on the number of reported crimes per 1,000 persons. These trends inform our strategies and help us focus resources where they are most needed.


Thank you for your continued support and collaboration is making Red Bank a great place to live, work and raise families. Together we are building a safer, stronger community.

Jason Keown began his law enforcement career in 2003, and joined the Red Bank Police Department as a patrol officer in December, 2014. After a promotional assessment process, which included a supervisory interview panel, Officer Keown was selected from a pool of 7 total applicants to earn the Sergeant position.



August: Patrol Officer John Pain Hired



John Pain graduated from the Cleveland State Law Enforcement Training Academy in 2023. He has previous experience as a correctional officer and college campus police officer.

August: Patrol Officer Jaycee Tharp Hired

Jaycee Tharp was hired in August and enrolled in the Cleveland State Law Enforcement Training Academy shortly after. After 520 hours of comprehensive training, Jaycee graduated in December and was honored with the Academic Excellence Award. Officer Tharp will now begin Field Training.



VCIF Detective and K9 Program

Through funding from the Violent Crimes Intervention Fund grant, VCIF Detective Kyle Dennis focuses on identifying, investigating and reducing violent crimes in Red Bank. Detective Dennis is also a K9 officer with his partner, Harry.

Training

All Red Bank officers completed their yearly required 40 hours of in-service training to stay in compliance with Tennessee POST- Peace Officer Standards and Training. This training, along with other specialized training, helps to ensure officers stay updated on the latest laws, policies and techniques necessary for effective law enforcement.

The knowledge and skills gained from this training help officers enhance public safety, as well as their own personal safety.

The list below highlights a small portion of the training completed in 2024

Field Training Officer School- Two officers attended the Collegedale Police Department's Field Training Officer School. They are now certified as Field Training Officers, and are responsible for the training and evaluation of newly hired patrol officers.

Spanish Classes- One officer has completed several online Spanish classes through the Chattanooga School of Language.

Gang Specialist Course- One officer completed a basic and intermediate course related to gang identification techniques and how to investigate a gang-related case from start to finish. The course was presented by Tennessee Gang Investigator's Association.

Narcotics Search Warrant Planning and Execution- One officer attended this course, which was conducted by the Regional Counterdrug Training Academy.

First Line Leadership- Presented by the Law Enforcement Innovation Center with the University of Tennessee, this course helps prepare first line supervisors for the transition from team member to team leader.

Child Abuse Investigations and Internet Crimes Against Children- Two officers attended this course, which was provided by Advanced Police Concepts.

Basic Criminal Investigations Course- One officer attended this 5 day course presented by the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office.

Equipment/Upgrades

- Two additional AXON in-car camera systems were purchased through grant funding from the Tennessee Highway Safety Office.
- Three new patrol vehicles and a new K9 vehicle were purchased and outfitted with required emergency equipment.
- Two additional patrol vehicles were finally put in-service after delays in shipping of the required emergency equipment that was purchased in a previous fiscal year.
- Outdated radios and Panasonic in-car camera systems were sold. Also sold were 4 vehicles (2 from seizures and 2 that were unclaimed).

New Police Vehicle Graphics

In October, several police vehicles were upgraded with new, modern graphics, intended to give a more streamlined, polished appearance. Eventually, all of our police vehicles will have this updated design.

In July, Officer Brantley Young assisted the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office with a vehicle pursuit that entered Red Bank's jurisdiction. Officer Young deployed the spike strips in the area of Gadd Rd. Two of the suspect vehicle's tires deflated, which rendered the car unable to drive. The suspect fled the vehicle, but was apprehended and charged with numerous felony drug charges, driving under the influence, several traffic offenses, evading and resisting arrest.



In November, Officer Tim Brown assisted the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office with a vehicle pursuit that entered Red Bank's jurisdiction. Officer Brown deployed the spike strips on Hwy 27 S near the Signal Mountain Rd exit, and the right front tire was deflated. The suspect vehicle managed to make it to the Martin Luther King Blvd exit, where the occupants fled on foot. Three people were apprehended and arrested for felony drug charges, felony theft, evading and resisting arrest.



New Electric Patrol Bike

Law enforcement agencies are continuously seeking innovative solutions to improve community policing, and the integration of e-bikes represents a significant advancement. By combining the benefits of bicycle patrols with electric assist technology, police departments can enhance their effectiveness, strengthen community relationships, and contribute to a more sustainable future.

Our police department has utilized bicycle patrol services for over ten years. Red Bank officers use bicycles to patrol special events, apartment complexes, and neighborhoods. This approach has proven to be a valuable community engagement tool as well as an enforcement tool.



Resources, Events and Programs

Distracted Driving Presentations

Sergeant Rusty Aalberg spoke at the **Southern Constructors**' monthly training about risks associated with commercial vehicles. In addition to discussing on-site hazards, participants engaged in activities demonstrating “inattention blindness” due to multi-tasking.



Approximately 110 **Red Bank High School** students participated in a Distracted Driving Cone Course at the school. The event educated students on seatbelt safety and the dangers of distracted and impaired driving.



Drug Take Back

Red Bank Police Department actively participates in the Drug Take Back events held in April and October, in collaboration with the Hamilton County Coalition and the DEA. Our detectives set up a booth to provide a safe and convenient way for residents to dispose of unused, unwanted or expired medications. This initiative helps prevent drug misuse.


Red Bank High School Community Fair

Three Red Bank officers completed a 32 hour Child Passenger Safety Certification Course in 2024. We now have 5 officers certified to install and inspect car seats.


Coffee with a Cop


Motor Vehicle Crashes

This chart reflects the total crashes for the year and compares them by month. There were a total of 394 reported crashes in 2024. Of those, there were 52 crashes with injury and 70 total injuries, with **zero fatalities**.

Response to Incidents

Vehicle Pursuits and Response to Resistance

Red Bank officers had 15 vehicle pursuits in 2024. Nine pursuits originated from a traffic offense, four originated from a criminal offense, and two originated from assisting another agency.

There were 16 Response to Resistance reports in 2024. The reports involved 10 Caucasian males, 3 African American males, 2 Caucasian females, 1 Hispanic male. Six of the subjects were under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Three of the subjects were mental health consumers.

Reporting crime statistics is mandated by law for all law enforcement agencies. Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS) is the method used to collect crime statistics in Tennessee. TIBRS is part of a national program (NIBRS).

Hamilton County agencies include: Chattanooga, Chattanooga Airport, Chattanooga Housing, Chattanooga State Community College, Collegedale, East Ridge, Hamilton County Sheriff's Office, Lookout Mountain, Red Bank, Signal Mountain, Soddy Daisy, Southern Adventist University and University of Tennessee at Chattanooga.
