As our department continues an upward trend in 2022, with more and more calls for service coming in every year, our personnel have continued to provide exemplary service to the citizens and visitors of Red Bank. This year, our personnel answered 1,022 calls from service, an increase of approximately 12% from 2021 and a 32% increase from 2020. Our personnel continue to respond to all hazards and provide the expertise and compassionate care that the public expects when they dial 911.

This year showed marked improvement in other areas as well as our call volume. With the new budget, we were able to promote a Fire Training Instructor to head our Training Division to ensure that our personnel maintain levels of proficiency to best serve our community and provide them with the emergency response that they deserve.

As we close out 2022, we are eager to see what the future has in store for Red Bank and how we can continue to serve our community through the Red Bank Way!

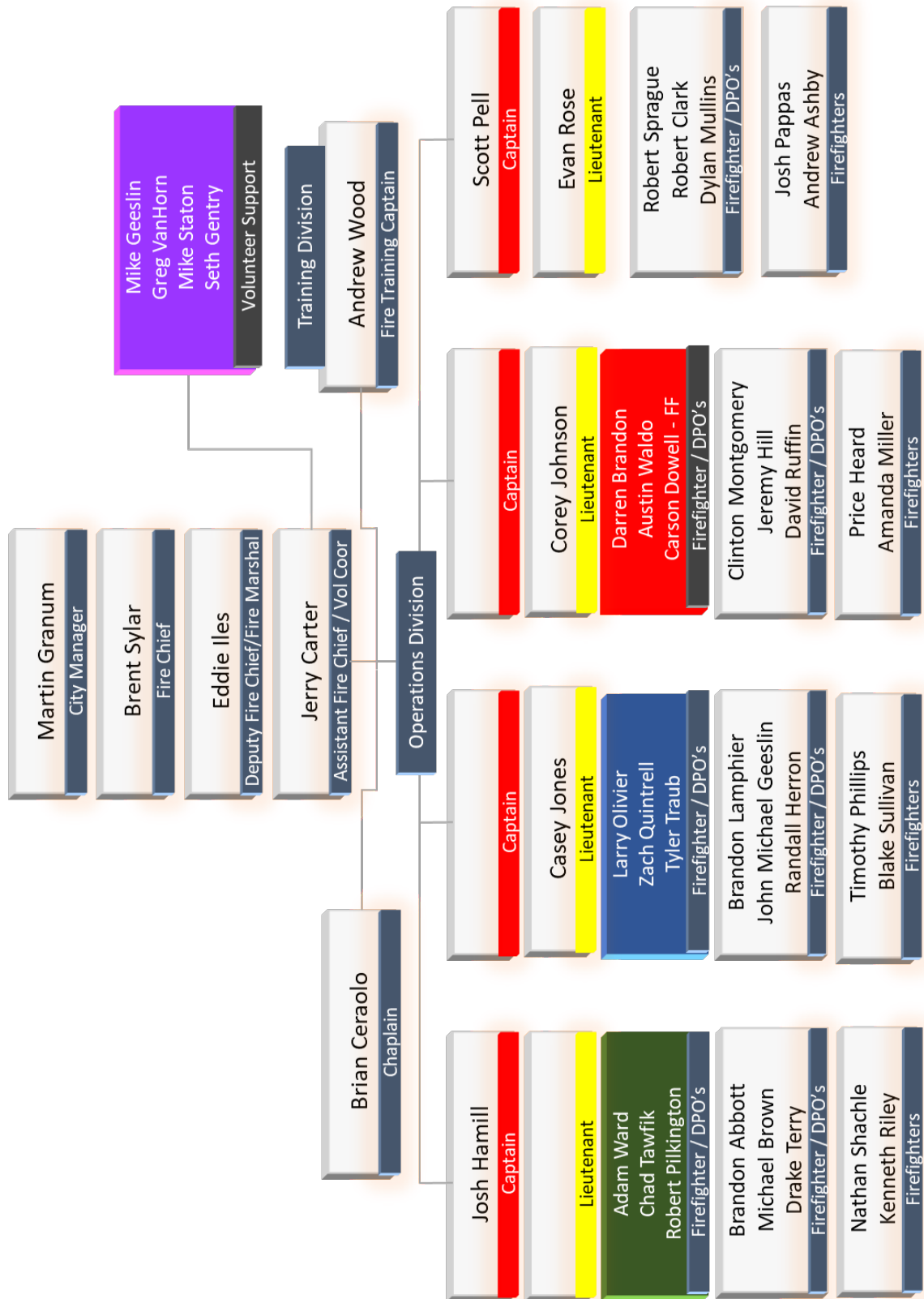

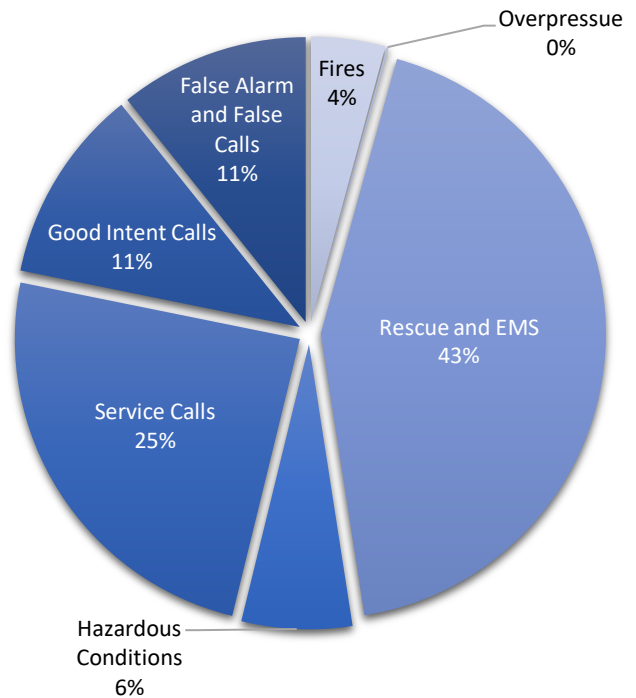

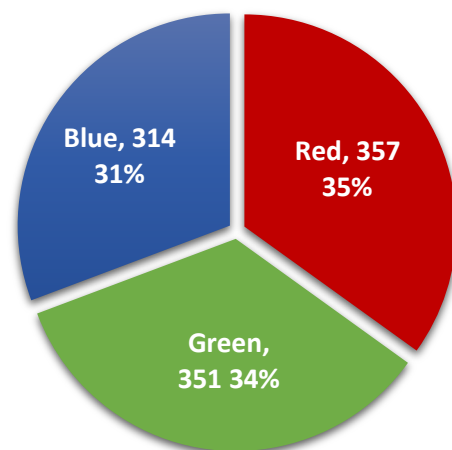

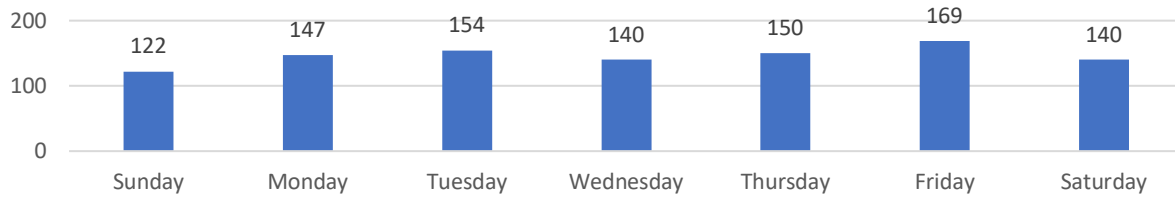

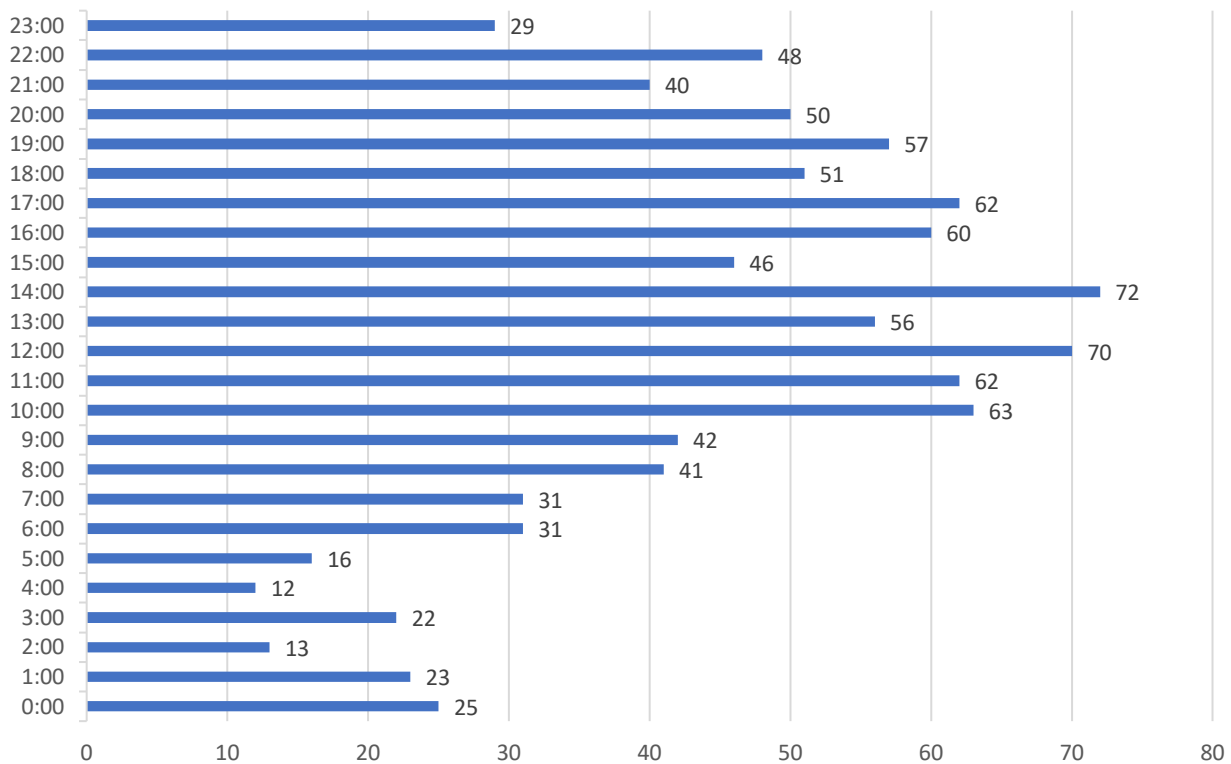




Incidents by Day of the Week

Fire Training

Fire Training Instructor

In the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 budget, the City Commission approved a new Fire Training Instructor position to oversee and facilitate training. Firefighter/DPO Andrew Wood was promoted to this position on August 8th and started working to ensure our personnel are best prepared to serve our community when called.

Physical Agility Testing

This year, a Physical Agility Test was developed to determine new applicants' fitness for duty and to assess all personnel annually to ensure that they remain physically fit for duty. In September, the new Physical Agility Test was implemented across the department.

Training Props and Equipment

To ensure that our personnel have all the tools necessary to remain proficient in their essential skills to perform fire suppression and rescues, we began to build a new training area and props for training. This year, we added a ventilation prop, attic simulator, forcible entry door, Keiser sled, and a forcible entry wall breach prop.
